Rector's Remarks

Written Reports for 2020

Adult Education & Formation

One Parish/One Book

At the Annual Meeting last year, we provided Brian McClaren's book *We Make the Road by Walking*. It was designed to follow the church calendar with short chapters estimated to take about 10 minutes to read for each week of the year. We met weekly until the pandemic prohibited in person meetings.

Rector's Bible Study Group

This group meets on Thursdays mornings with the Rector. It was known as *The Men's Group* until Mother Beth arrived. Then it was known as *The Five or Six Guys, a Gal, and a Dog Group.* Now we just call it the Rector's Bible Study. All are welcome regardless of gender identity or species (except for cats). We study the scripture that is assigned for the upcoming Sunday by the Revised Common Lectionary.

Shakespeare & Christianity Group

David Riggs continued to lead the Shakespeare & Christianity group, which met in the church library between the 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. The group was finishing *The Tempest* just before we went into lockdown. It has been on hiatus since then, but we hope it will resume in the fall with a new Shakespeare work, and if not in person then on Zoom.

Women's Spirituality Group

In 2020 the Women's Spirituality Group continued to meet weekly on Wednesday mornings for its seventeenth year. For all these years up until the end of May of 2020 when she entered hospice care, the group was led by Susan Miller. Susan asked Mary Jennings to substitute for her on occasion when she was ill or out of town and she continued to mentor Mary in this role throughout her final months. Her memorial was held on August 15th. Susan was not just a woman OF Spirit, but a woman one experienced AS Spirit. Group members miss her greatly. We grew in Spirit individually and as a group under her tender care.

It is a tribute to Susan's work that the group members wanted to continue meeting. We have shifted, as have all other parish activities, to the ZOOM format which has worked well for us. Since May we have read *Holy Envy* by Barbara Taylor Brown, *Jesus: A New Vision-Spirit, Culture, and the Life of Discipleship* by Marcus Borg,Jesus and the Disinherited by Howard Thurman, and are near completion on our Advent selection, The Reed of God by Caryll Houselander.

Our next book will be our own Bishop Curry's new book, *Love Is the Way*, which we will probably begin on February 10th. We are always open to anyone who wants to join. You can be assured of a warm welcome, a sacred and safe place to explore your faith while learning about the faith of others, and the opportunity to participate in discussions of timely and relevant issues of today's culture and how our faith guides us to respond. Buildings & Grounds

Junior Warden Angela Hey oversaw the buildings and grounds. The gardens were maintained by gardeners. Thanks are due to the Wrucke family who helped maintain the grounds. In particular, Ruth Ann Wrucke dug the garden, pruned plants and ensured that lights for the carillon bell tower were not covered by vegetation. Dead and dying plum trees were removed. The pathway between the Narthex and the bridge was repaired with new footing.Thanks to Jim Szewczak and his crew, the retaining wall that supported the flower bed outside the church offices was replaced. Jim and his crew also installed hardware on the patio so that the preschool could put up screens to separate outdoor classrooms. Plumbers had to replace a pipe beneath one of the staff washbasins and unblock the drains. As a result, the septic tank was also pumped in early January.

Carillon Bell Restoration Project

As a result of our parish's strong support for the 2020 and 2021 Stewardship Campaign, we were able to take full advantage of the two \$25,000 Matching Gifts for the Bell Restoration project. With these donations, we have now raised over \$96,000 towards a total cost of \$125,000. The Stewardship Campaign remains our first priority for your financial support, but we also welcome contributions to the Carillon Restoration Fund if you would like to help us get this project completed. The Carillon School

The Interim Directors, Christine Williams and Cara O'Connell, were officially made Codirectors for the Carillon School. At the suggestion of the school staff, there was also an official name change from the Carillon Preschool to simply the Carillon School. It more accurately reflects what the school does in that it has a full and wide curriculum. Carillon continues to serve families in the community who choose our school for the curriculum, the skilled, experienced and dedicated teachers, and the faith-based foundation the nurtures character development not doctrine. Carillon's campus shut down in March of 2020 due to the "shelter-in-place" mandate. The staff pivoted to an online format to stay connected with the families. School resumed in September 2020, and we have been running in-person classes since then. We started a new program this year called the Butterflies, which is a 2year-old program (5 students). We continue to hold the Honeybees, 3 and 4 year-old class (6 students), and Ladybugs, 4-5-year-old class (11 students). We were not able to hold the Caterpillar program for children ages 18 months to 2 years due to the restrictions on size of gatherings because this program needs the caregivers present. We hope to add that program back in the 2021-2022 school year. We continue to fill this year's vacant spots with new and returning families, and enrollment for next year looks strong.

Children & Youth Ministries

Cara O'Connell continued as the Director of Children, Youth and Family Ministries. The Sunday School program for 2020-2021 met in person until the state issued its shelter in place that went into effect in March 2020. The nursery program for children 4-years-old gathered every week during the 10 a.m. service. The older children programs for 5-12 yearolds also met during the 10 a.m. service. Approximately 10-12 children attended the programs. Mother Beth checked in with teens who were in last year's confirmation class via zoom. The teens then started to gather to prepare lunches periodically with Mother Beth, Music Minister Lauren, and the Outreach Committee (out on the terrace, with face masks and socially distanced). As of September 2020, Sunday School classes have been held through zoom meetings. All family events (School Toiletry Collection for Homeless, Easter Egg Hunt, Backpack Drive, Blessing of the Backpacks/Ice Cream Social, Pumpkin Painting, Gingerbread House Decorating) were canceled this year due to the pandemic. The Christmas pageant was made into a movie that was shown at the 10 a.m. service on Sunday, December 27, 2020.

Churchyard & Funerals

Paul Lovoi and Linda Millard continue to be trustees for the churchyard. The balance for the Churchyard fund as of 12/31/2020 was \$31,030.84. The Vestry decided this year that it would issue refunds for the original purchase price if someone so requests, as we have a limited number of niches.

We had three deaths in our community in 2020. Services for Charmian Hilleary and Susan Miller were held online via Zoom, a first in our history. Then following both services, they were both interred in the columbarium. Peter Llewellyn's service and interrment will held sometime in 2021.

COVID Response & Regathering Team

The year started well, then in March concerns were voiced about the SARS-CoV-2 virus. So, since mid-March, the church has met online using Zoom and recording services to YouTube. Angela Hey chaired the Response & Regathering team. The Diocese required each parish to submit a plan before it will be permitted to reopen. In June, the Regathering Team produced a Regathering Plan for reopening the church safely and submitted it to the Diocese. Thank you to Dr Danny Alegria (a retired medical doctor), Marty Coddington, Penny McCulloch (a retired nurse). Lena Perkins and Lauren Wittine (Christ Church music director) for contributing to the report. Even though there were no more services in the church after March, four homeless families, church staff and the preschool were using the campus. The Regathering Team installed hand-sanitizing stations on the campus – some fixed to the wall, some on moveable stands. We also provided posters from the County for the parish administer to post, reminding campus visitors to take precautions against the coronavirus. Deanery & Diocesan Convention Report

Carl Cheney, Sherry Lund, Kaethe Langs, and Stu Langs were Peninsula Deanery delegates this past year. Carl is leading and Sherry is a member of a subcommittee to update the Deanery By-Laws and re-define the mission. They are also both members of a subcommittee that is assessing how the Deanery can increase its engagement and impact with parishes through shared expertise and services. The Diocesan Annual Convention was held in October via Zoom. Sherry & Carl's resolution compelling the Diocese to significantly increase financial reporting and transparency was resoundingly approved, one of seven resolutions that came to the floor. Sherry was also elected to a 3-year term of the Diocesan Executive Council, which is the board of directors for the Diocese.

Fellowship Team Report

Carl Cheney, Lenore Lovoi, Sherry Lund, Carol Wentworth formed the Fellowship Team to create ways for our parish to stay connected during the pandemic. The Fall kickoff in September began with a drive-in movie in the church parking lot. Carol and Carl delivered ice cream bars to cars while everyone watched Zootopia. In October and November, Zoom Dinners for 4 gave parishioners an opportunity to meet online in small groups to get to know each other better. When Covid numbers increased dramatically in November, the oncampus event originally planned for December had to quickly pivot to a Cookies, Caroling and Community event on Zoom. Bags with cookies, craft kits and song lyrics were delivered on the first Saturday in December. The next day, parishioners of all ages decorated their Zoom spaces and wore festive holiday attire. We sang many of our favorite carols along with both nostalgic and contemporary videos. Five parishioners shared heartwarming holiday messages at intervals during the program, and the Zoom meeting remained open afterward for informal discussion, as we were all eager to catch up. It was wonderful to connect with our community, both local and in other states. The next Fellowship event is being planned for February, 2021.

Music Director's Report

Despite the challenges faced by the music program in 2020, music at Christ Church has continued to thrive and even grow in some aspects. Last year, our goal was to enable more of our parishioners to participate in music; in an unexpected way, the pandemic made this possible! Each week, members of our virtual choir receive materials to record their part at their own convenience. This flexibility has opened choir to some members who were unable to attend traditional rehearsals. Over the past 10 months, our virtual choir has grown and developed as all of us learn the best practices for making music in this new way. Ultimately, this new knowledge culminated at Christmas in the Christ Church Carol Project, where we put together simple instructions for everyone in the parish to record themselves singing Joy to the World. I was so pleased to be able to cap off our Christmas Eve worship in this fun and community-oriented way.

2020 also saw the inaugural performance of our newly formed adult bell choir. It has truly been my delight to direct this project, which was originally conceived as a way to make music safely during the pandemic, but I hope to continue to grow and develop in the coming years. Bell choir is such a wonderful way to include in worship music those who do not feel comfortable with singing, and I see it as a vital part of our ministry going forward.

Outreach & Mission

2020 Highlights:



Home & Hope: housing for homeless San Mateo families



Life Moves: shelter for 160 adults and 33 families

- Mardi Gras fundraiser: raised \$16K for the three charities, including matching funds.
- May: toiletries collection drive at church and in the community (Life Moves)
- May: Grocery Drives begin. Over the year we ran 4 grocery drives for homeless families (Home & Hope)
- June: Began providing dinners for the homeless at Maple Street Shelter. Provided more than 1100 dinners over the rest of the year.
- July: hosted 4 homeless families who stayed in tents in our parish hall for two weeks (Home & Hope)
- August: filled the backpacks for 15 homeless kids (Life Moves, Home & Hope). We also provided 100 headsets so shelter kids could attend school remotely.
- September/October: Linen drive for 33 homeless families. 55 blankets, 21 towel sets. (Life Moves)
- October: Teens & college students began making bag lunches for the frail elderly. Plus making warm fleece blankets. We did it again in November.
- October/November: "Change for GAIA" provides \$2,000 for medical supplies to combat AIDS in Malawi, Africa.
- December: collected warm outerwear for homeless adults at Maple Street Shelter including 60 pairs of socks, hats, gloves and scarves.
- Ongoing: 1) collecting motel-sized toiletries and shower shoes for Life Moves shelter at Maple Street 2) supporting the garden at the Maple Street shelter.

Stewardship

We have raised \$333,000 from 63 donors towards our 2021 goal of \$375,000. This is an incredible show of support from our parish and we thank each and every one of you who has participated. We also want to acknowledge that 28 of our donors to the 2021 Stewardship Campaign have increased their level of support from last year. We know this has been a challenging year for many and we are humbled by your decision to commit even further to the financial health of our church. Indeed, Christ Church is small but mighty. We were in need of your increased generosity this year and words cannot fully express our gratitude. Our committee is still working hard to try to raise the full \$375,000 and we hope that those who haven't pledged yet will consider doing so. Collectively we can keep Christ Church strong!

Treasurer's Report - Annemarie Redmond

Christ Church reported a decent year-end to an unprecedented year. Our net revenues (Pledge,plate, gifts and facility use) was \$380,144, a decrease of \$30,293 over 2019, Expenses totaled \$400,911 a decrease of \$12,200 from 2019. As most of our expenses are staff and campus maintenance, the operating costs are fixed, but we did save in some areas such as choir & organ maintenance & Sunday School. Additionally, the Diocese gave us an assessment relief of \$60,000, spread over 2020 & 2021. Normally we allocate \$20,000 per year from the Carillon School to cover their occupancy costs but given the uncertainty of the student attendance and operation, we ceased this in July. We applied for and received a PPP loan of \$98,251 during the spring shutdown. This was facilitated through our business account at Wells Fargo and is indicated as a liability on the balance sheet. About \$58,250 was allocated to the Church and the remainder to the Carillon School. Overall the Church showed a loss of approx. \$20,000.

The Carillon School got off to a mixed year with great uncertainty as some of the enrolled students withdrew and classes needed to be reworked. Treasurer's Report continued from previous page.

However with \$47,000 in deferred tuition remaining from the 2019/2020 year end, scholarship funds, \$40,000 PPP, additional students and savings, preliminary reports show the Carillon making about \$30,000 if there are no unforeseen expenses and the monthly costs of \$20,000 remain in line.

Our endowment account gained \$142,000 (11.5%) and the Music endowment gained \$12,216,(13%). We spent \$4,500 on a new oven for the kitchen and \$6,460 from Music endowment to the choir. The Carillon bell tower fund received \$46,000 from generous donations and Outreach Program was also the recipient of a \$15,000 generous benefactor.

During the year the Vestry authorized opening a new business checking account with First Republic Bank, they were more responsive to our needs during the shutdown and offered us the ability to make deposits digitally and avoid in person banking. We aim to eventually close down the Wells Fargo account but need to resolve some outstanding issues. There was no audit done in 2020 due to the lack of Diocesan Auditor and the shutdowns but we will try and get one done in 2021.

I would like to thank Nicole Sprague for her dedication to the Church during this past year, we are truly blessed to have her on the team. Annemaried Redmond, Treasurer
